In the weeks leading up to Christmas, many families decorate their homes with tinsel, wreaths and other festive ornaments. A Christmas tree is placed inside the house and gifts are laid below it. Children are often given an advent calendar which helps them count down until Christmas. Carols by candlelight events are held in the weeks before Christmas. Crowds of people gather at night to sing Christmas carols.

Christmas is celebrated on the 25th of December. On the night before Christmas, it is common for children to leave out treats such as biscuits and carrots for Santa and his reindeer. Children wake up early on Christmas morning, excited to see what presents have been left under the tree or in their stockings. Many people go to church on Christmas Eve or Christmas morning.
