

Seasons in Australia

Australia is a very large country. This means the climate changes greatly from region to region. While the regions of the far north have only a wet season and a dry season, most of Australia experiences four seasons. If you live in the northern hemisphere, you might have noticed something unusual about the months of each season. Australia is in the southern hemisphere. That means its seasons are at opposite times to those in the northern hemisphere.



Summer

Summer in Australia falls between December and February. These months are hot, and people are often looking for ways to escape the heat. There are many beaches in Australia so during summer, many people visit beaches. Summer days are long in Australia, and so people enjoy spending a lot of time outdoors. Cricket and tennis are popular summer sports. Fruits such as cherries, mangoes and watermelon grow well in summer. Many thunderstorms occur during this time of the year.

Autumn

The autumn months in Australia are March, April and May. In some countries, autumn is known as 'fall'. The weather begins to get cooler during the autumn months, and some trees will lose their leaves. Football season in Australia begins during this season. Fruits such as apples, figs and pears are in season during autumn.


Winter

The season of winter in Australia falls between June and August. Winter nights are generally cold and winter days cool. Some areas of Australia get very cold. In fact, there are many ski fields in the south of Australia. Other areas of Australia experience more of a mild winter. Winter days are short. Many people enjoy getting outdoors during winter to make the most of the clear blue skies and catch some sun. Rugby is a popular winter sport. Grapefruits, kiwifruits, and oranges are in season during winter.

Spring

Spring is often warm, sunny days and cool nights. Spring in Australia is the period between September and November. The weather begins to get warmer, and the days begin to get longer. New plants grow and flowers bloom. Many koala and kangaroo joeys leave their mother's pouch for the first time during spring. It is common for other animals to give birth in the months of spring.
