Sentence Length & Tension Using Short Sentences

Varying sentence length is important for making your writing feel alive. Writing with sentences all the same length can be boring for the reader.

Short sentences can...

- Draw attention to dramatic moments.
- Create a feeling of panic.

Long sentences can...

- Make time feel slow and events feel relaxed.
- Provide descriptive details.

The following passages have overused longer sentences. Rewrite each, using some short sentences (or sentence fragments) to help express more intense action.

1. Wade looked out the window to the pavement below. Wade knew there was no other option and that

	he had to jump. He took a deep breath and placed one foot on the ledge, followed by the other. Summoning all his courage, Wade pushed off the ledge and leapt as far as he could.
